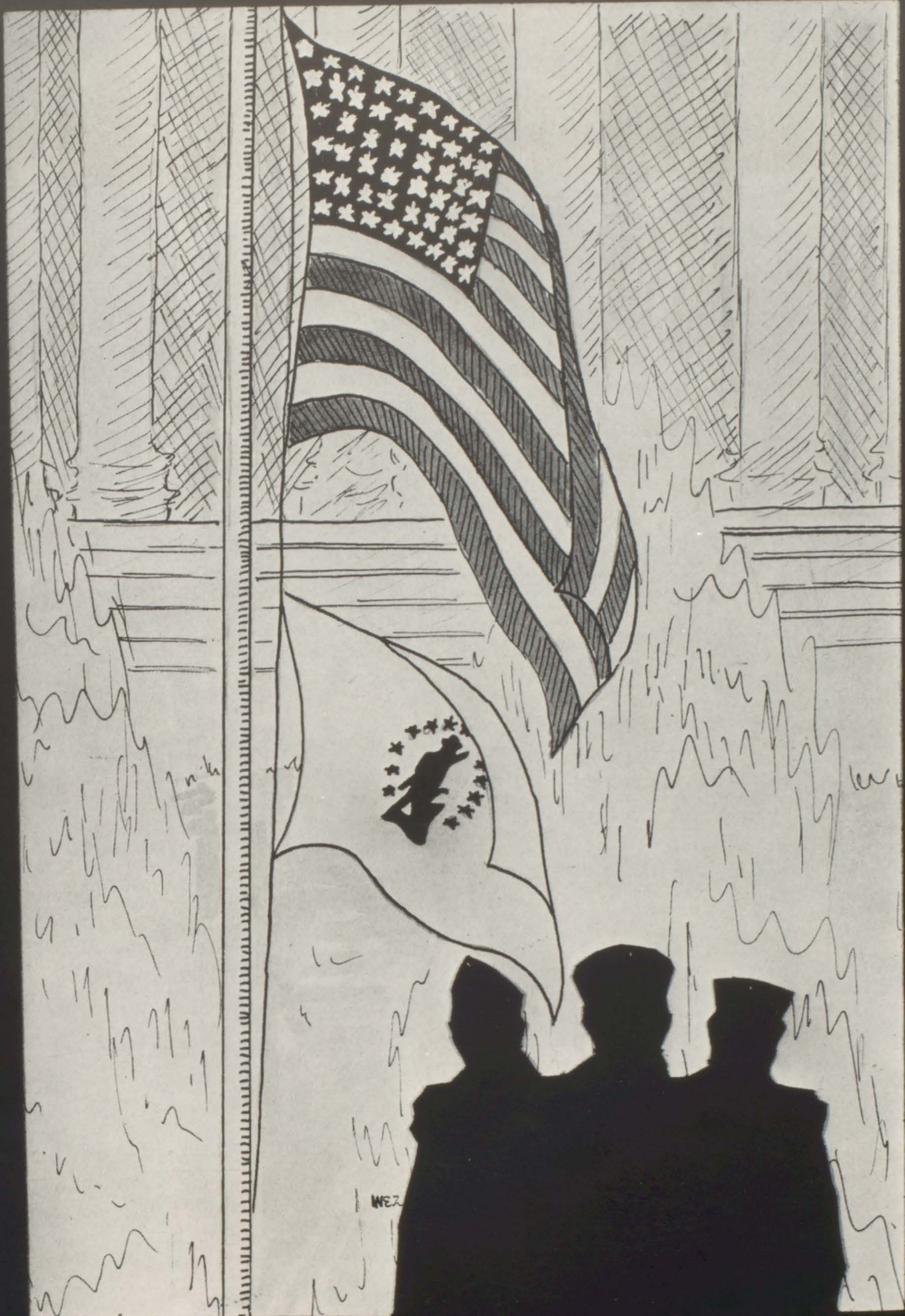
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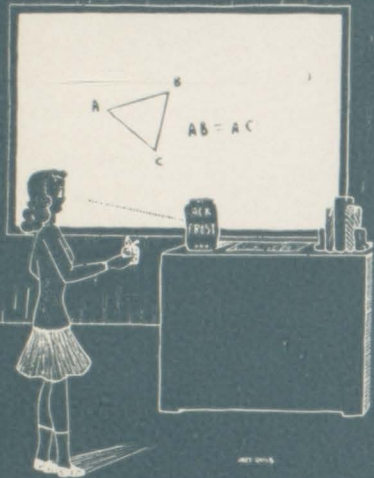
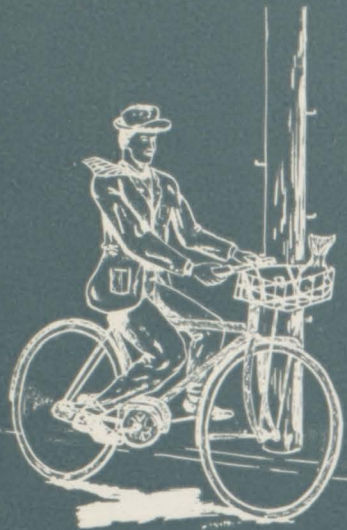
## SERVICE STARS

## IN MEMORIAM

DR. J. T. P. CALKINS, A.B., M.S., Pd.D.  
(1877-1942)

ONE of the guiding powers behind Hempstead's Public School system for a long period of time was Dr. John T. P. Calkins. He was instrumental in the construction of Hempstead High and furnished the plan for the modern one story grade schools where education gets its first start. After the buildings had been created, he next proceeded to install the supervisory system to make them work.

But some of his best accomplishments were yet to come. In 1935 he helped the dream of Hofstra College become a reality. He had concrete plans that would enable those eager to learn to obtain college level instruction in high school. This is important to every high school student, for it goes a long way toward solving the problem of college expenses.

The fact that Dr. Calkins considered education a tremendously important factor in the progress of a nation may be seen from his dedication of our school:

“. . . to the unnumbered throng of children who here will gather knowledge, virtue, kindness, reverence, and hope—this house is dedicated.”

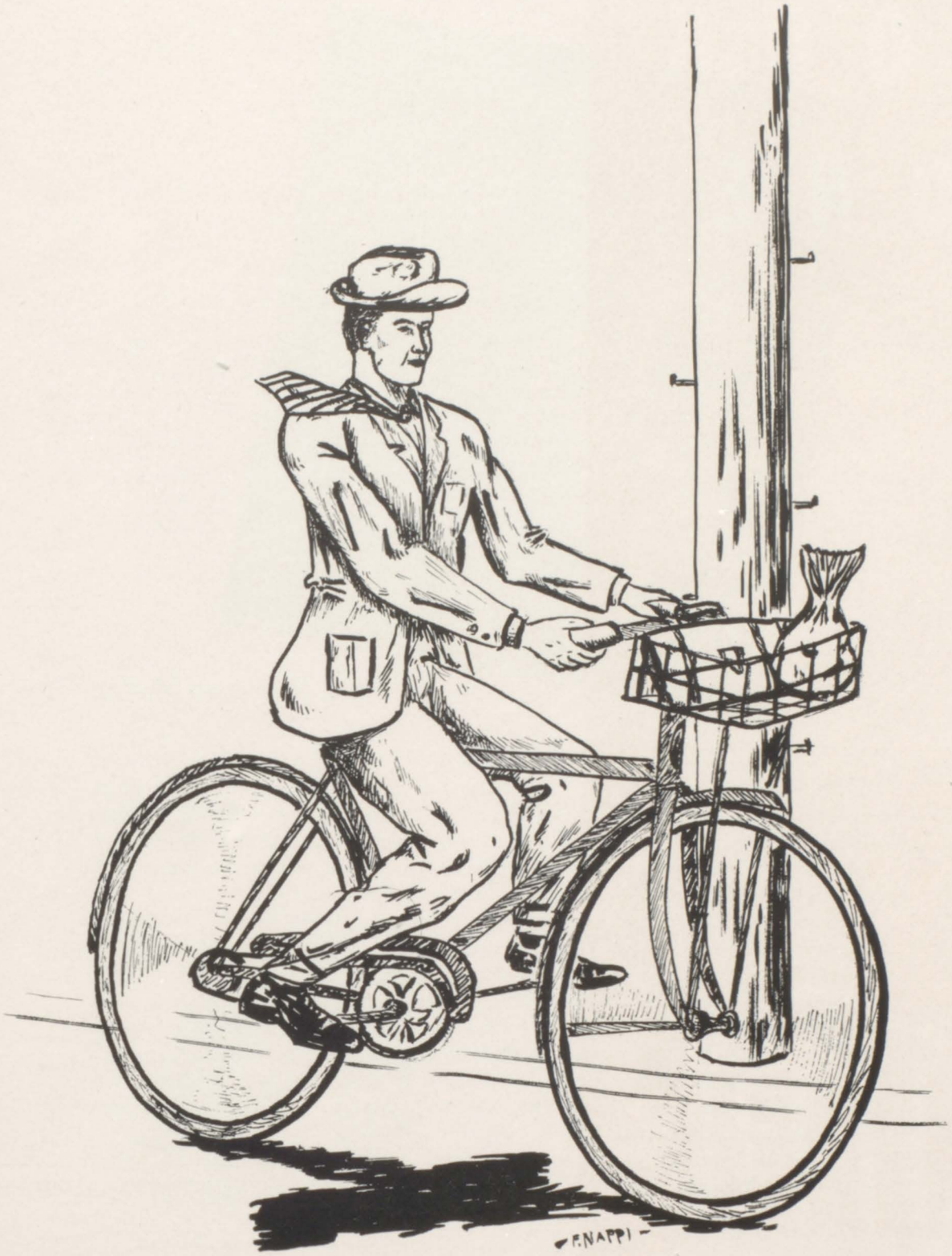


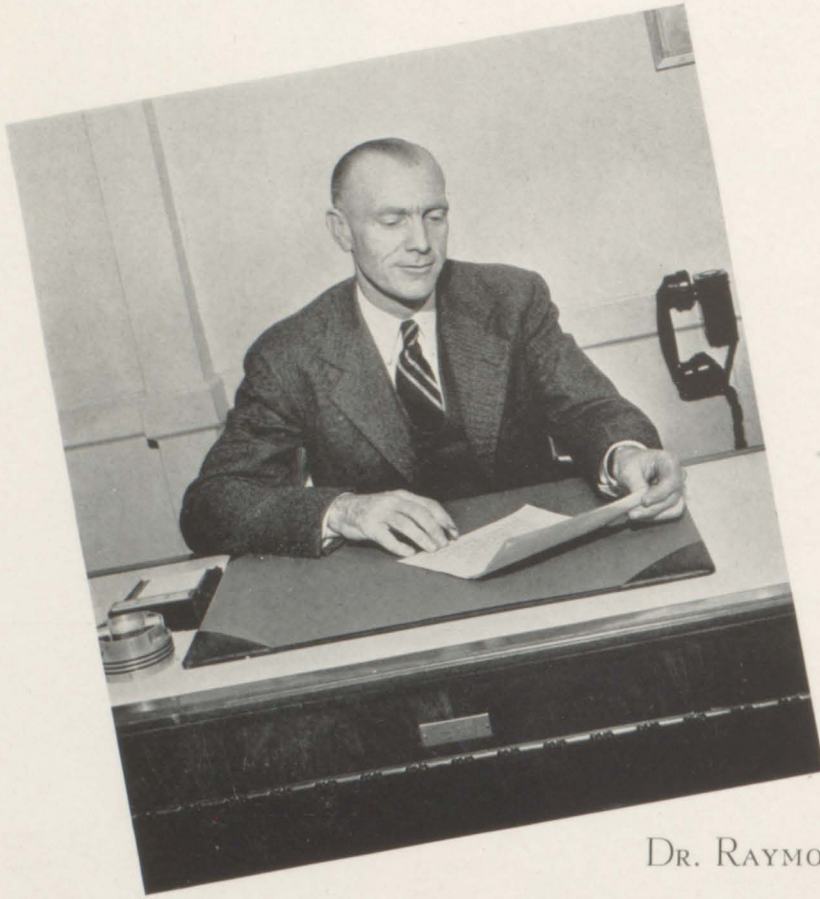

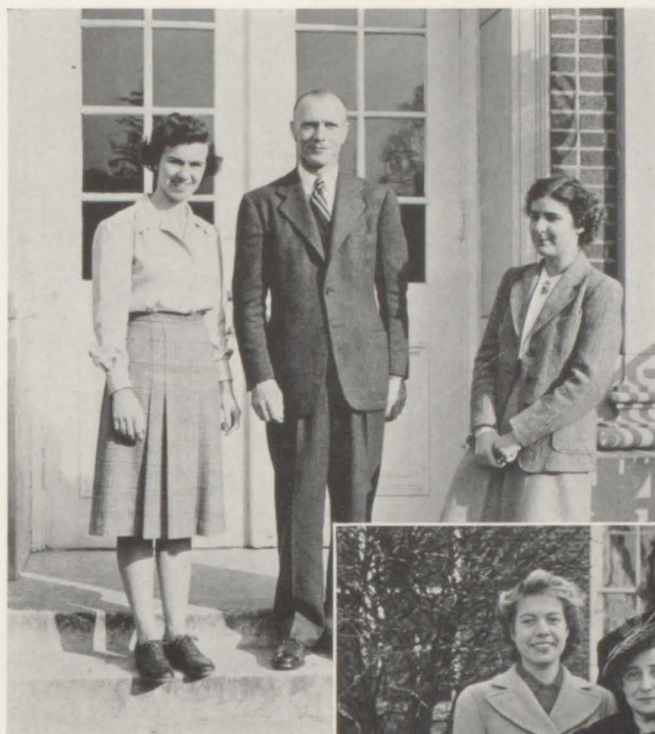
## SCHOOL NUCLEUS

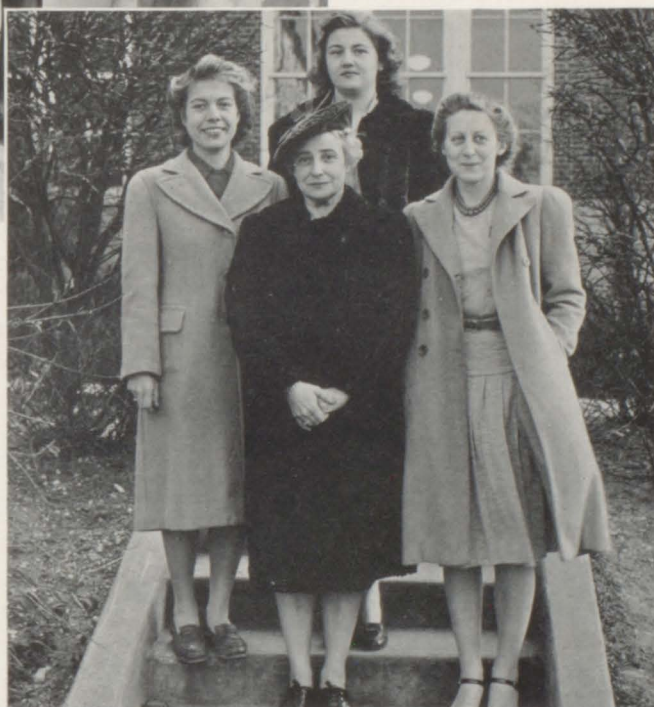

## IN ALL OUT WAR EFFORT, PROFS PROVE PATRIOTISM

**H**EMPSTEAD HIGH SCHOOL has always been extremely proud of its faculty, and can be doubly proud this year in view of the excellent job which each and every teacher is doing for the war effort. It is our purpose to present, in the following section, a summary of the various activities connected with the war effort in which our teachers have participated during the past year.

Our Principal, despite his multiple duties concerned primarily with the curricula of H.H.S., has found time to perform many extra-curricular services, both in and out of school. Besides acting as an air raid warden and as chairman of the U.S.O., he is on the War Bond committee, is publicity chairman of the British War Relief, and has been in charge of the various rationing programs.

He has offered the facilities of the high school for any and all war purposes, and is always on hand to help out.

Our Superintendent of Schools is doing more than his share, what with being sub-chairman of the Nassau County Defense Council, an auxiliary policeman, and another member of the A.R.P. He has spent a great deal of time on the consideration of the fuel problem, in which he has been faced with the decision of how to get the maximum amount of heat from the minimum amount of oil allotted to the schools.

The personnel in offices 1, 2, and 3, have all donated a great deal of time and effort to war activities. Many of our office workers take First Aid courses and donate time to the Red Cross, while several others have taken courses in home nursing and nutrition.

We are particularly proud of those women who belong to the Motor Corps, and a great deal of consideration goes to the assiduous knitting which so many of the teachers have been doing lately.

The faculty membership in the Red Cross is very large, and each worker is doing an important job for his country. Many of our teachers have taken the various courses available through the Red Cross and nearly all of them are proficient at First Aid and can be counted upon in any emergency. Several of our faculty members have helped to organize H.H.S.'s Junior Red Cross workroom and have given a great deal of time and effort for this worthy cause. The output of the girls in the organization has been rewarding, as they have made many such useful articles as stretcher mattresses, afghans and "ditty" bags for the soldiers. Great credit goes to the fine work of the Junior Red Cross's faculty advisers.

Besides doing Red Cross work, many of our teachers have given a great deal of their time to assisting in the various rationing programs. What with sugar, gasoline, fuel oil, and food curtailments, the rationing boards have been kept very busy. Since the schools have been used for this purpose, a large number of teachers have donated time and effort in ration work.

Another particularly important duty which is being performed by a great many of our faculty members is that of the air raid warden. We have a great many representatives of the A.R.P. at H.H.S., and one member of our faculty has instructed various organizations in air raid precautions.

Several teachers spent their summers working at war plants and helping in the important battle of production. Although it was hard work, they say they enjoyed it because it gave them the rewarding feeling of concrete contribution to the war effort. The teachers at the Junior High, who are especially skilled in mechanical operations, have taught various courses in sheet metal, mathematics and blueprint reading and have worked in several war plants.

Besides the various organized activities in which so many of them have participated, our faculty members have joined the millions of people who are doing their bit on the home front. There are countless individual duties

which are being performed by all good citizens as their contribution to the war effort, such as saving kitchen fats, collecting scrap, and the all important job of buying War Stamps and Bonds. Our teachers have done all these things both at home and in school.

Several of them have been instrumental in organizing the War Bond drive at H.H.S. and it is due partly to their efforts that we were so successful in tripling our estimated quota.

Hempstead's scrap drive was an extremely successful one, and one to which the high school gave a large contribution. All of our teachers collected scrap at their homes, and several of them supported the scrap drive at the school. This is just one of the many combined home and school activities in which our faculty members have participated.

Many of the courses offered at H.H.S. have taken on extra importance in wartime. This added significance of so many of the various subjects has not only increased the size of the classes but has also provided additional work for the teachers. Not only must they continue to teach the fundamentals of such courses as physics, trigonometry and mechanical drawing, but they must also in-

Such courses as the one dealing with radio fundamentals and code have been added to the curricula, and several courses such as those dealing with basic instruction concerning airplanes have become available to H.H.S. students at the Junior High.

Besides performing those many duties which we have mentioned in the preceding paragraphs, several members of our faculty have made even greater sacrifices. Already we have lost a noticeable number of teachers to the armed forces, and that number is likely to increase in the following months. We have nothing but respect and admiration for our ex-teachers who are now serving their country, and we wish for them a safe return after a speedy victory.

Yes, the members of our faculty have proven that they are fine citizens. The



resumé of their activities which we have just presented was intended to show our readers how much the faculty has done for the war effort and to help them appreciate every teacher all the more as a definite contributor to victory.

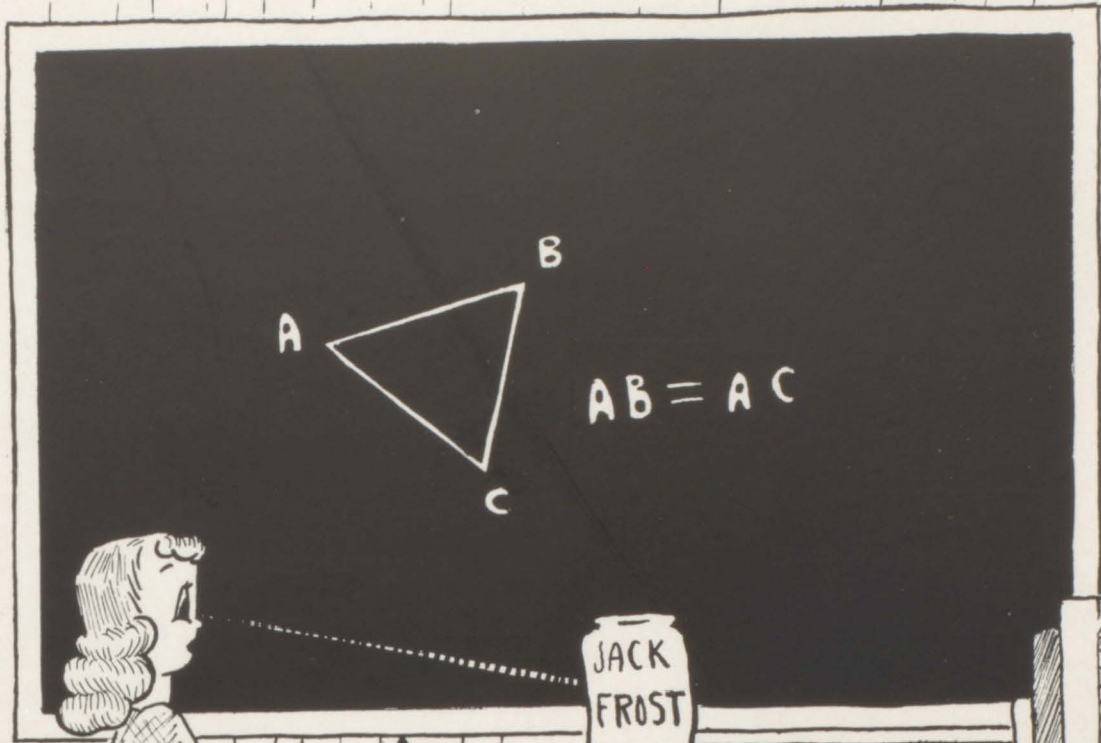
# BOOK TWO

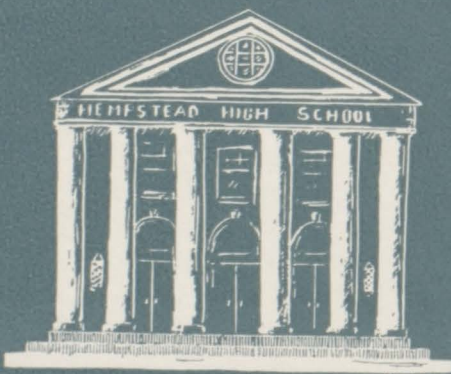


# BOOK THREE

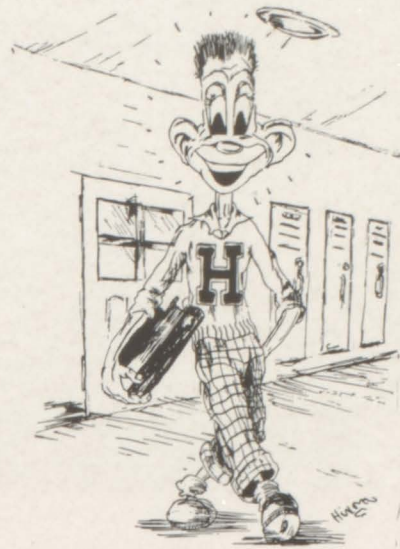
# HOMEROOM "REPS" SELL WAR STAMPS

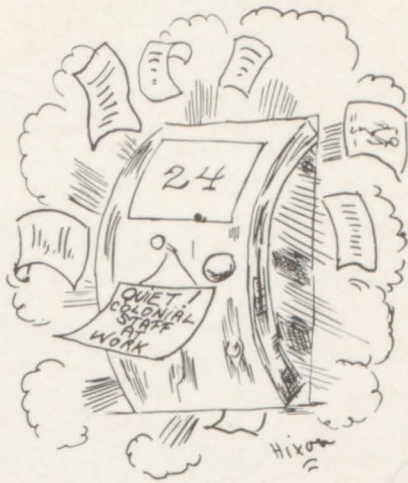

**M**ORE than a quarter of a century ago, the Patriot was launched upon its career of keeping H.H.S. informed of school events and activities. When the first Patriot news hounds snooped through our halls, they were reporters for a tiny five-by-six monthly publication. The Patriot of today has grown from this humble beginning to the present sizeable five columner so familiar to all of us, and so eagerly awaited every other Friday.

What would H.H.S. be without room 49? It is here, in the Patriot's birthplace, that busy reporters, covered with chalk dust and spouting strange jargon, write up their "hot copy" while seemingly hysterical editors labor amid masses of paper. 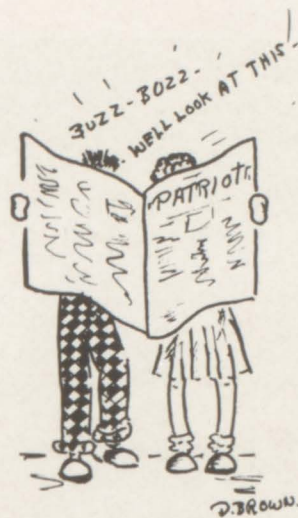

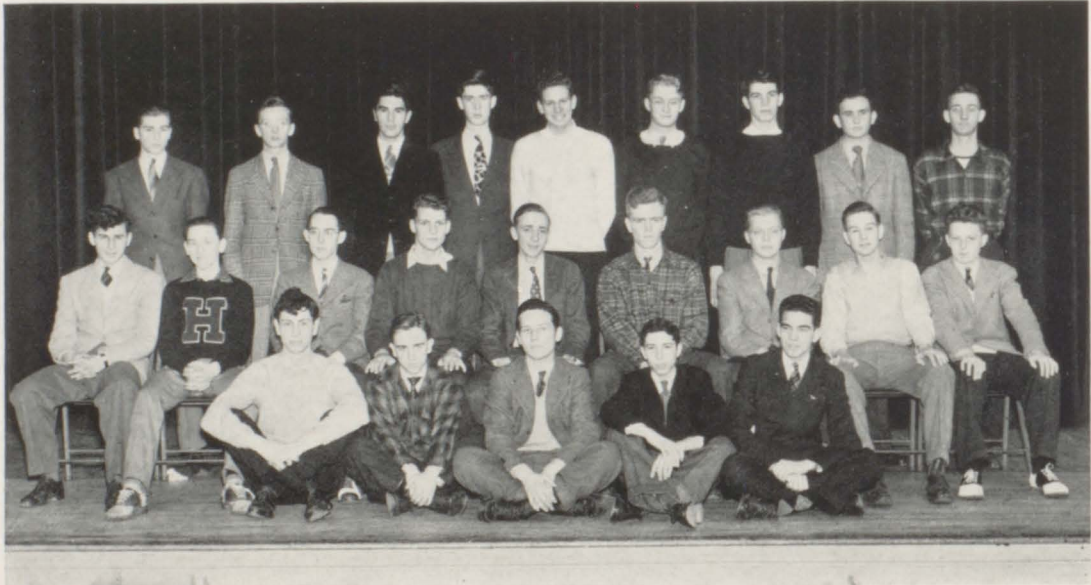

Hempstead High School should consider



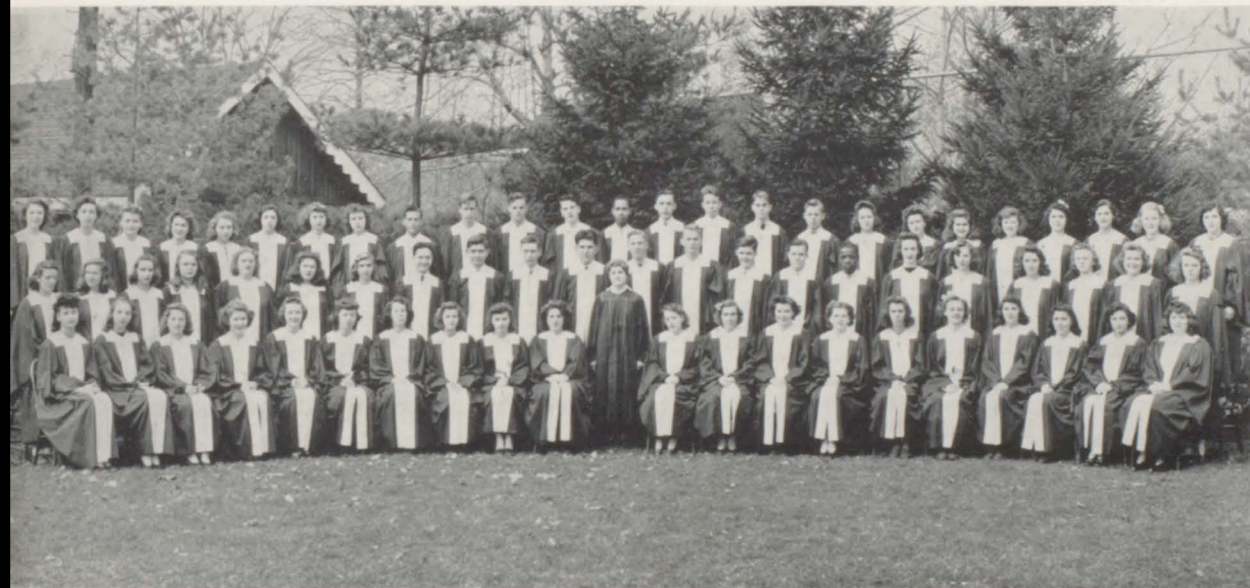

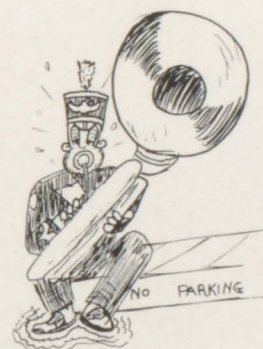


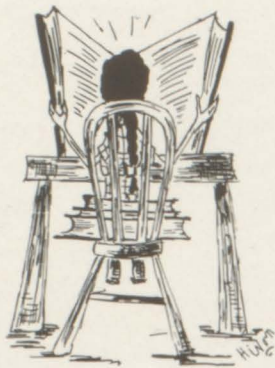

To top off the year, our potential artists are planning a trip to the city, an excursion which will provide a good time for all.

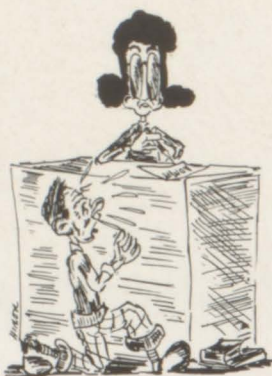

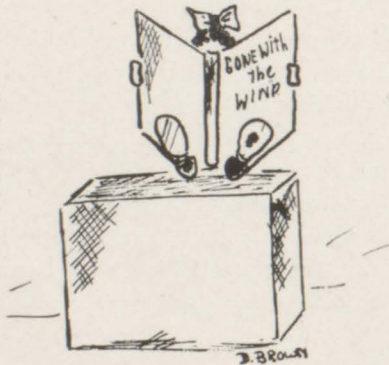
## SOPHOMORE LITERARY

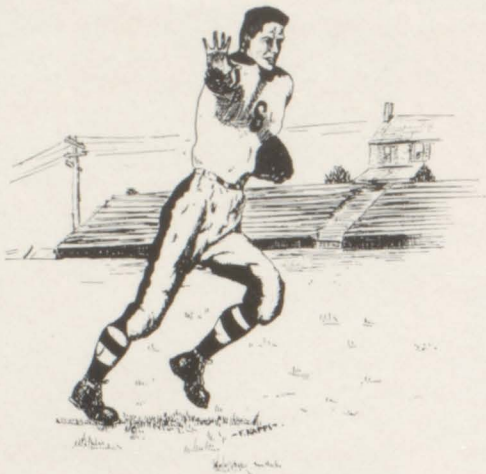

WITH autumn comes football; with football comes another Hempstead team to carry the glory and honor of Hempstead High onto the gridiron. War or no war, football carries on.

Hempstead began its own war on October 3rd and like the United Nations, lost its first battle. It was Freeport, not the Japs that pulled the Tigers' tail to the tune of 26-6. Bill Folz ran 56 yards for Hempstead's only score. The next week proved no better for H.H.S.'s embattled fighters, as they lost to Baldwin 7-0. This game inaugurated the Tigers' trips via hayrick.

*October 17th* — Special communique from Sewanhaka: Mr. Fay announces that our forces at Sewanhaka have beaten the enemy 13-0 for our first major victory. General Fay says that a new plan of battle turned the tide. Leaders of the attack were Bill Folz and Mike Tabinsky.

*October 24th* — Our communique announces that we again beat the enemy from our door as our men finished off Chaminade 7-0. Bob Wayne and Bill Folz were the heroes of the action.

*November 7th* — General Fay sends this report to our newsroom: "Today we faced the stiffest enemy force that we are likely to meet, and are happy to report that we licked North Tarrytown 19-6 for this season's greatest upset." This victory snapped the Towners' three year winning streak. Heroes of the day were Bob Wayne who plunged over from the one foot line to score; Bill Folz who ran 78 yards for the second score of the game, and Stan Krolack who intercepted a pass and ran back 40 yards.

## HUB MATMEN SPLIT SEASON

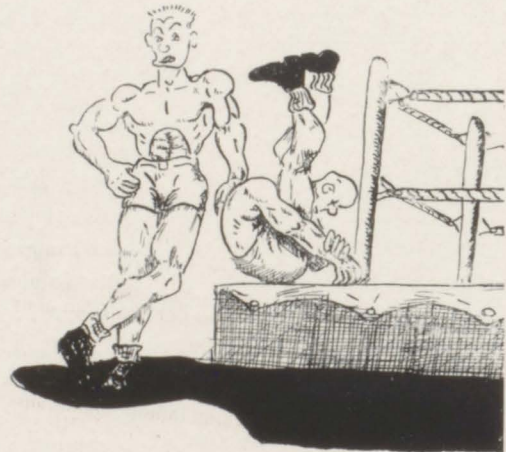

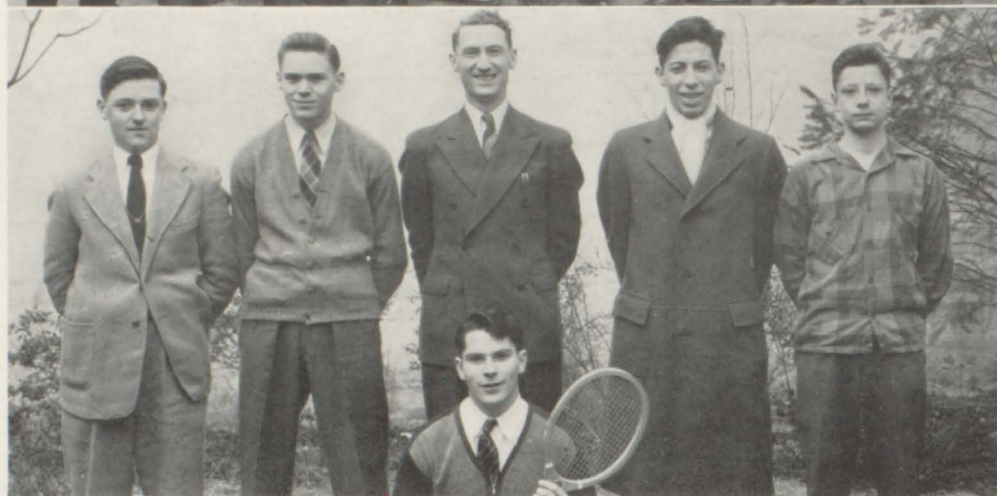

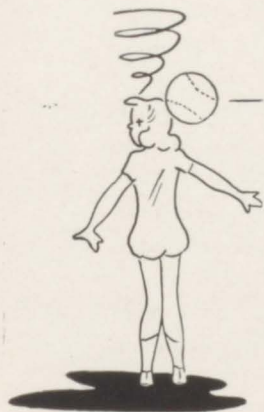

## LET BALL, TAKE TWO

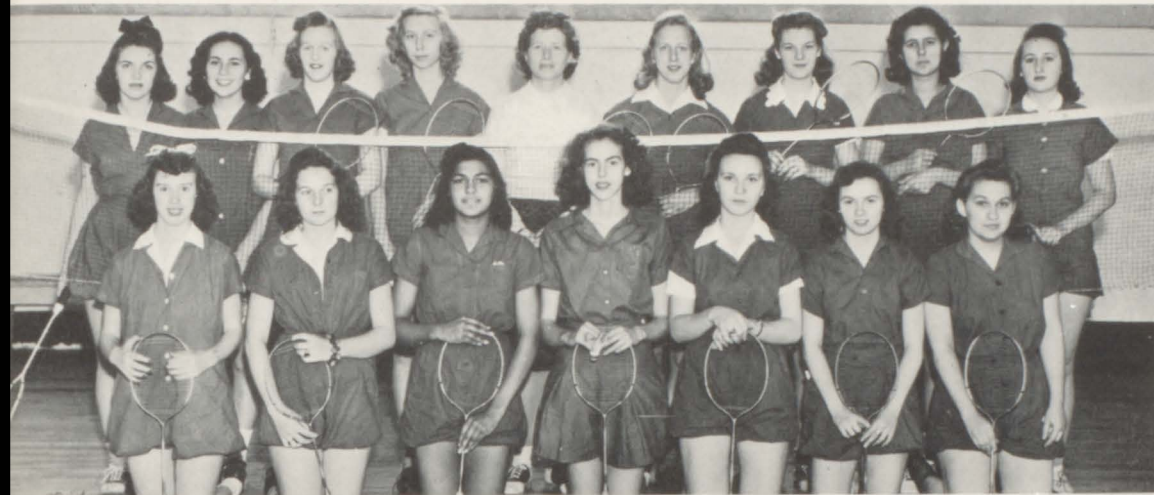

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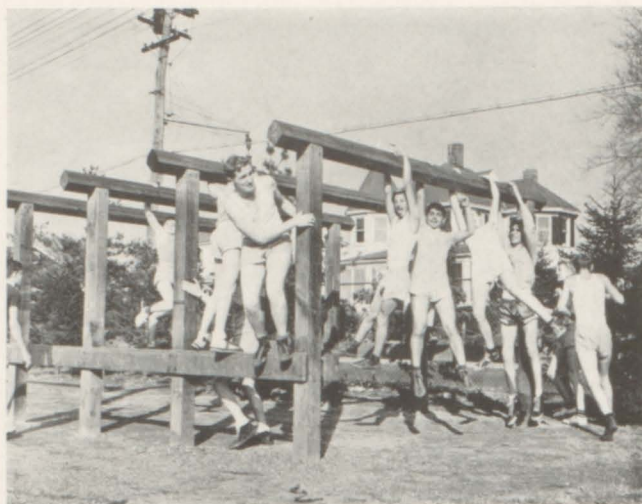

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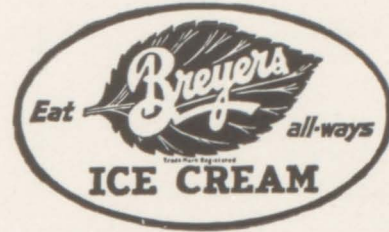
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## TAKE A BOW, MR. KELLY

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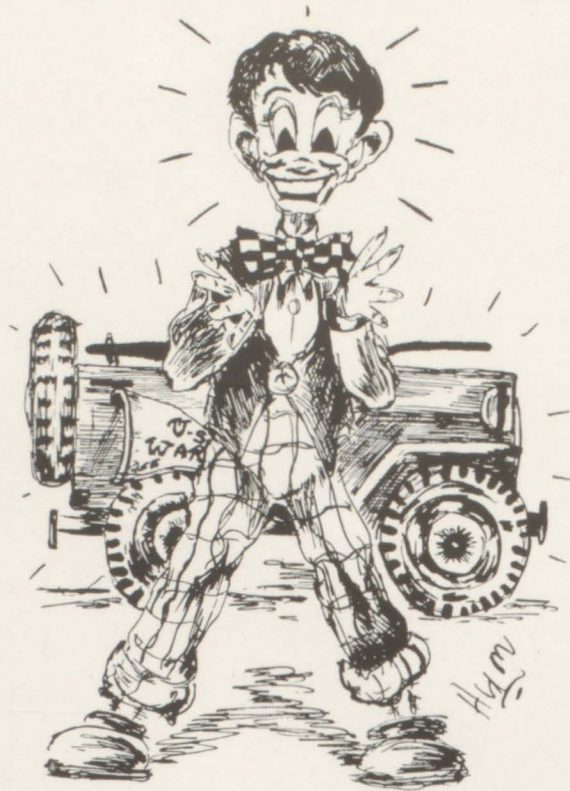
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## HEMPSTEAD SCORES AGAIN!
