Side Shows

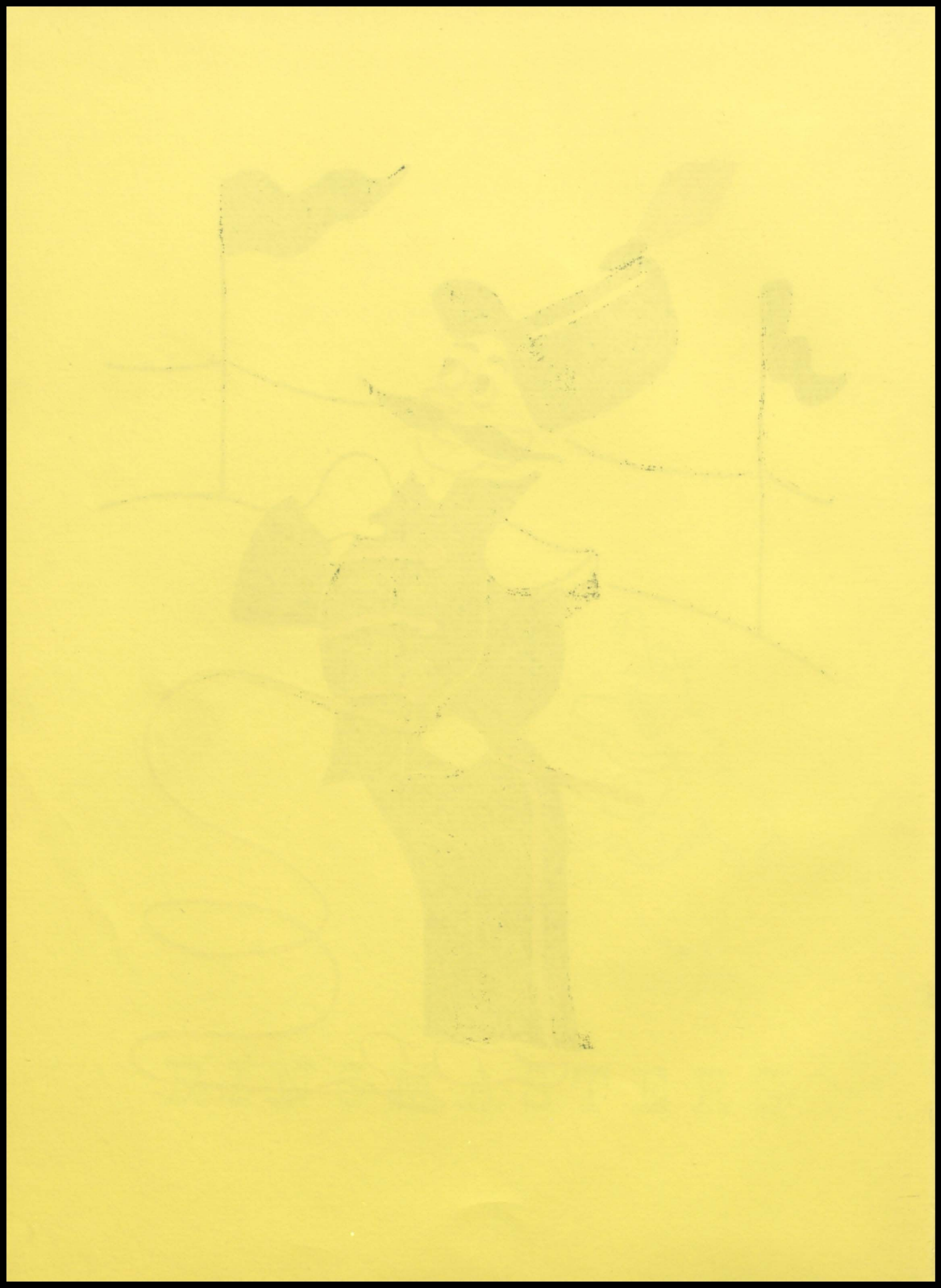

A SCHOOL board conducts a big business involving the budgeting of hundreds of thousands of dollars annually. Needless to say that the many educational opportunities provided in Hempstead are the direct result of the foresight and business acumen of the local school board.

The function of a school board has often been little understood or appreciated. The following excerpts from *School Boards in Action* might afford some enlightenment.

"School boards in America wield great power because the local school district is a unit of state government. The school board is responsible to the people and should not be limited or curbed by being made subservient to other units of government. Civic-minded groups in each community should concern themselves in selecting candidates for the school board who possess openmindedness, human understanding, and common sense.

"The most important activities of the school board are policy-making for the school and evaluation of all proposals and criticisms, and of school progress. The school board member as an individual has no official power, since only the action of the board as a whole is recognized by law and accepted practice.

"In the best school administration practice the board legislates and the superintendent executes. The board also appraises the administrative results obtained by the executive. Careful adherence to this division of basic responsibilities is essential."

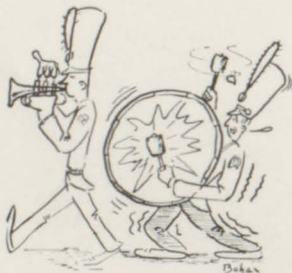
DR. WILLIAM GORE

DR. Gore's successful supervision of the Hempstead schools is due in part to his thorough education and to his wide experience as an educator. He first attended the University of Illinois; then he studied at Columbia University. After this Dr. Gore went to Harvard, from which he entered New York University.

Dr. Gore was Superintendent of Schools at Jacksonville, Illinois, and also at Webster Groves, Missouri. Here he gained the experience which has been invaluable to him in his present position. His duties include the approving of requisitions for books, the supervision of courses of study, and the selection of teachers for the entire system. He decides which policies are most beneficial to the welfare of the schools and then directs these policies.

Dr. Gore has interested himself widely in community and civic affairs, never remaining aloof from townspeople or students. He is known everywhere, as is his constant companion, Fluff.

His affable manner has endeared him to his townspeople; his administration of school affairs and his awareness of community problems are equalled only by his intense interest in youth.





DR. RAYMOND MAURE

ONE of the main reasons for Hempstead High's smooth operation is its principal, Dr. Maure. His job needs both a broad education and a deep sense of social judgment.

His school attendance was prodigious. After graduating from Oneonta High School in 1912, he studied at Wesleyan College for two years; then he received his Bachelor's Degree at Alfred University. He attended Columbia, after which he returned to Alfred for his Master's Degree. Additional work at Columbia followed, then some courses at Rutgers, and finally a Doctorate at New York University.

Dr. Maure's excellent experience as a teacher and administrator prepared him for his present position. He taught mathematics and science at Fulton High School in New York. He also coached football and basketball there. Bernardsville, New Jersey, knew Dr. Maure as its assistant principal. Then in 1921, he came to Hempstead High.

To experience his understanding nature one need only enter his office. Instead of a stiff, cold room, one finds a comfortable chamber with a quiet atmosphere of amicability above it. Instead of a gruff and officious executive, one finds a friend.



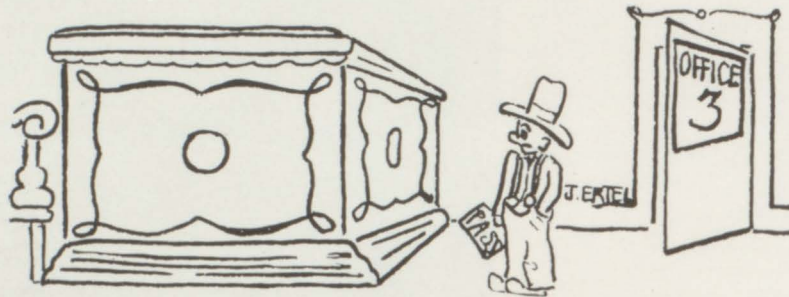
OFFICE STAFFS

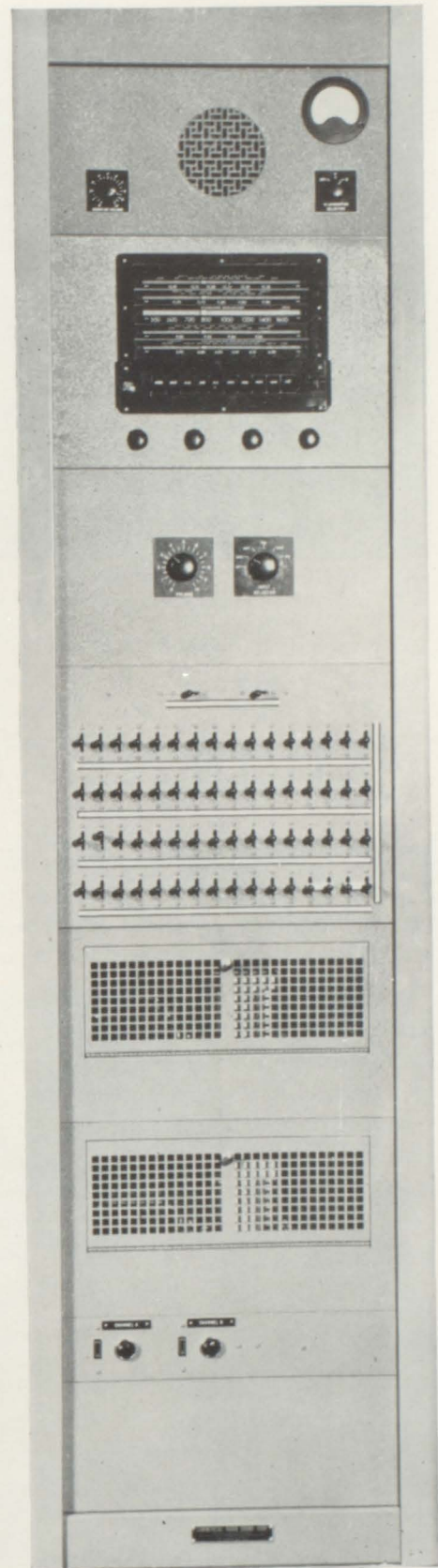


G. O.

Reporters and feature writers sit around preparing stories or comparing notes; others count words. Of course, the editors are always reading material to criticise or accept. The air is also filled with cries of "How do you spell ambidextrous?"

or similar questions. In addition people are always stopping in with questions, material and the like. Then, there are passed back and forth the usual quips one finds wherever several people meet.

Finally the pieces are in, counted, accepted, typed and checked. The printer picks the typed sheets up at the editor's home. Then there is a brief interval of time during which type is being set. When the material comes back it has been printed on long sheets of paper, one column wide, called galley proof. There are two sets of this. It is re-read by the editors.

Then comes dummy night. The editor-in-chief and managing editor make the dummy. The two editors each have a large board on which they tack an old copy of the paper. Cutting all the margins off one set of galley proof, they try to make the columns fit the available space. This involves a great deal of work and they often stay until seven o'clock that night. To make the material fit, it almost always requires cutting, that is, taking out words, sentences or even paragraphs. When the material fits the space, the articles are

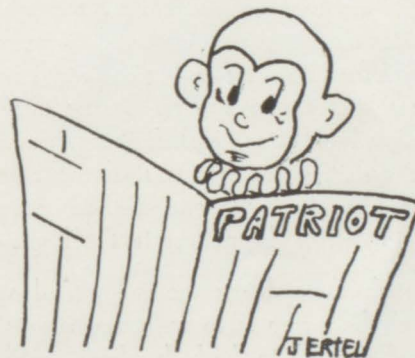
pasted to the old copy. The editors then go through the other set of galley proof and mark anything which has been cut, put dummy and proof in an envelope, and send it to the printer. The staff's work is then completed, but this process is repeated for the next issue.

When the two thousand copies of the paper are delivered to the school, they go to the circulation staff. This group counts out the quantity each home room has ordered. The bundles are marked with the home room number and the quantity of paper. During home room period this staff distributes the bundles to the home room representatives. In addition they are responsible for sending a copy to each member of the Board of Education and to each advertiser.

The business staff gets the ads for the paper. The money from these plus a G. O. allowance finances the *Patriot*. They also prepare the dummy for the ads. This staff sees that any changes which the advertisers want in their ads are made. The advertiser has the right to change his ad when-

ever he so pleases by sending in written instructions or telephoning the staff.

The advisers, Mr. Goldy, Miss Naftalin and Mr. Turnbull, feel that the students do a great deal of work to bring out the *Patriot*. Many work on it six out of every ten working days. This is one of the reasons why the student body can refer to the *Patriot* as "our" paper and with justifiable pride.

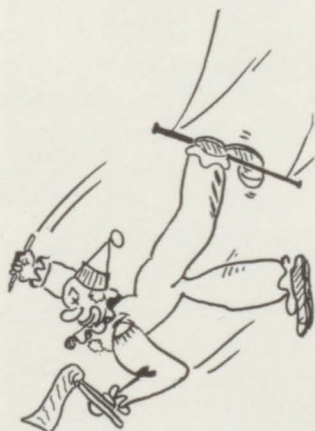
JUNIOR SECRETARIES

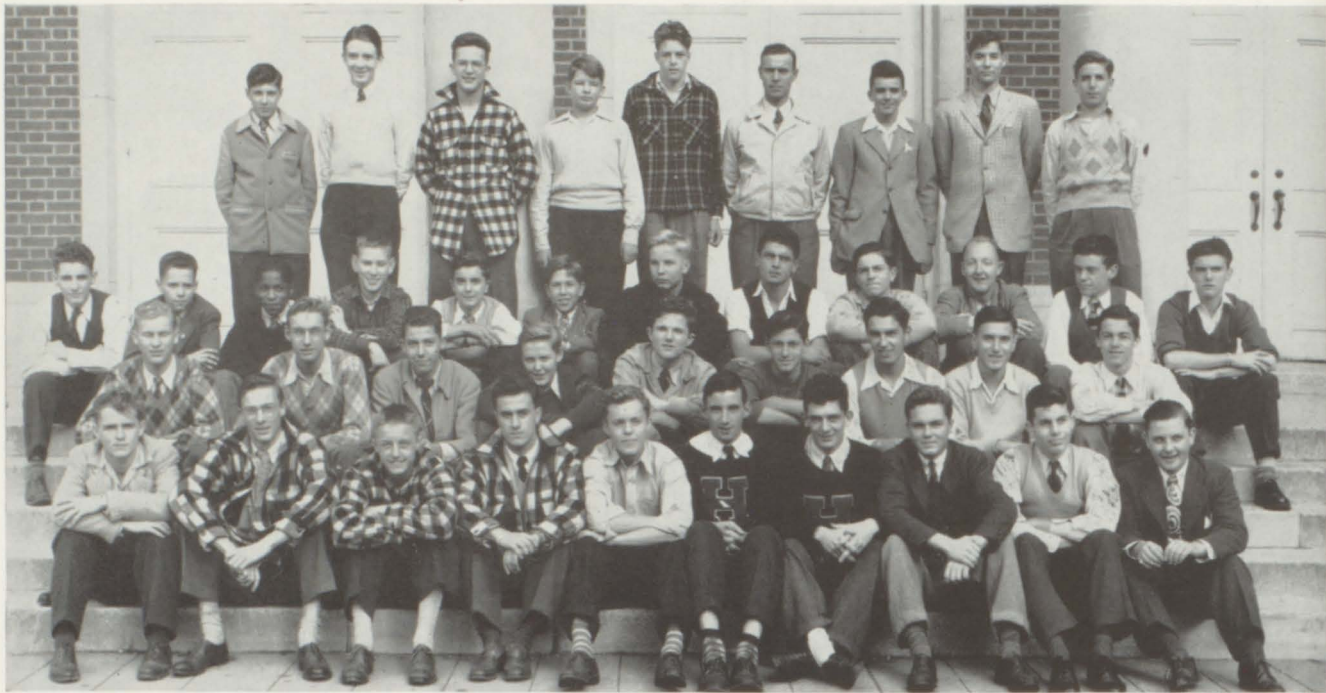

SKETCH CLUB

The last step is taken when they are fired. Firing the clay means putting it to bake in a white hot oven for about nine hours. The final product is a piece of jewelry any girl would like to wear.

Another section was interested in styles. They studied the latest fashions and sketched them or used their imaginations in making up new ideas for clothes in fashion designing. The students participating



in fashion designing become more skillful in creating original ideas for clothes. Those interested in fashion sketching become adept in their work.

The third group wished to add even more silver bracelets to their present collections, and waited anxiously for the silver to become available so they could start their work.

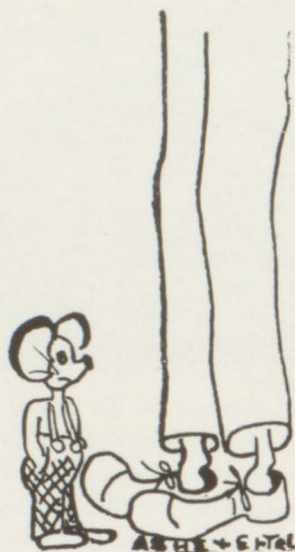

THE CHOIR



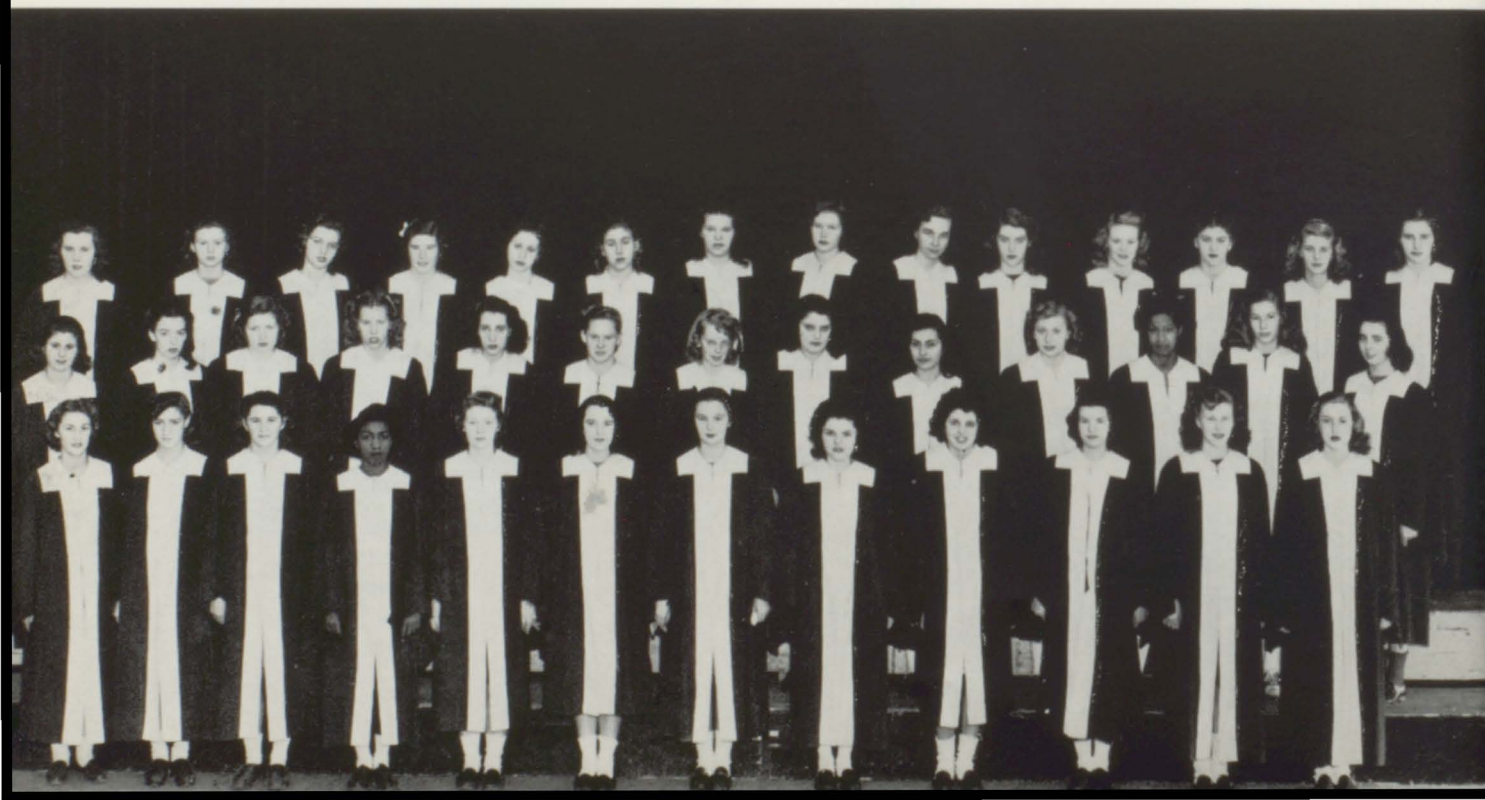

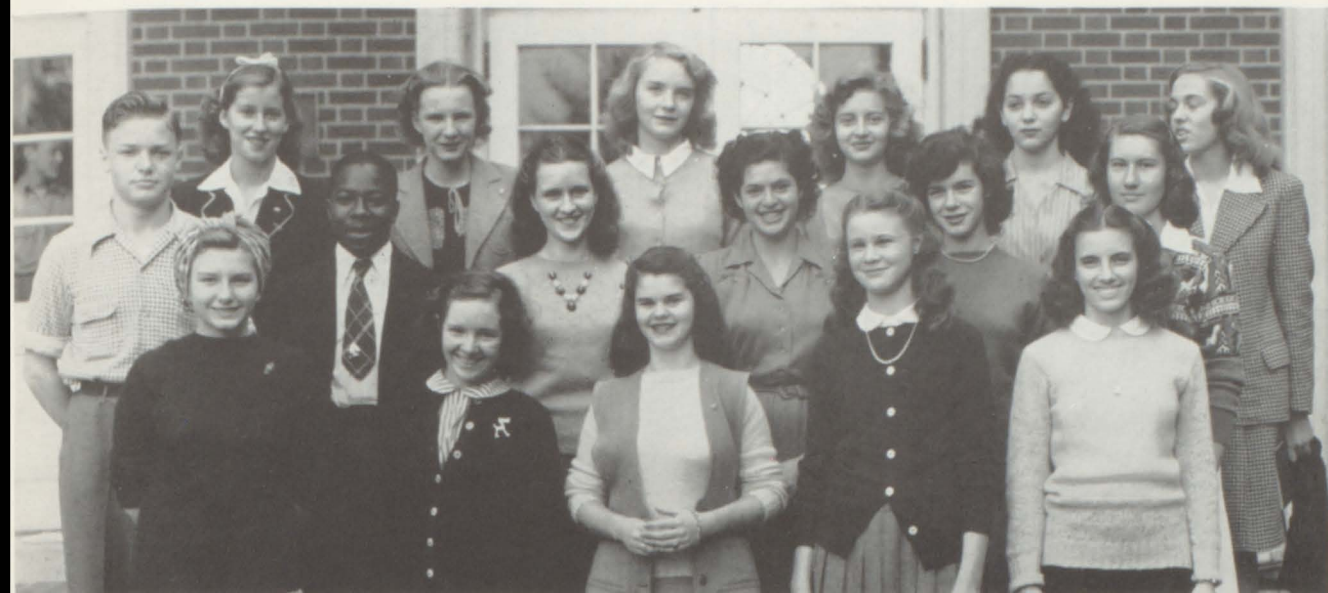
Members plan their activities from month to month. As usual this year there was a Christmas party. Also as usual, a prize will be given to the freshman girl who receives the highest average during the year.

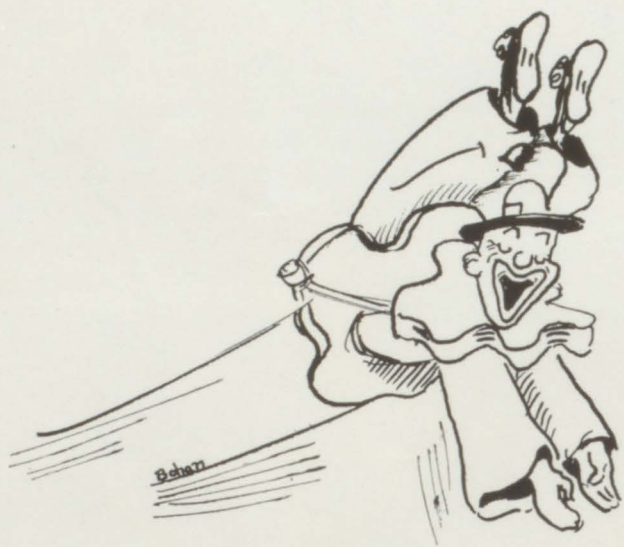

BASEBALL

AFTER two excellent years the law of averages caught up with the Hempstead Tigers. During the 1943 and 1944 baseball seasons the Tigers had the enviable record of 32 games won and only 6 lost for a percentage of .842. The end of the Tiger reign as county champions came during the 1945 season, when they won only 6 of 17 contests played.

Starting the 1945 season Hempstead lost to Lawrence, 9-8, and Baldwin, 6-2. The Tigers blanked Freeport, 6-0, but lost to Mephram, 5-2, and Mineola, 3-2. The Faymen then soundly trounced Chaminade, 10-0, defeated Baldwin, 4-1, but lost to Freeport, 3-0, Sewanhaka, 4-3, Mephram, 5-2, and then regained winning form by defeating Valley Stream, 7-2. Garden City won, 5-2, but the Tigers won a close one from Lawrence, 7-6. Hempstead then lost to Mineola, 11-3, and Central, 2-1. The Tigers defeated Chaminade, 4-1, and ended their dismal season by losing to Sewanhaka, 5-3.

THE Hempstead High track team won top Island honors by completing an undefeated and untied season. The team also won all championship meets it entered and to top it all, took six trophies. Mr. Krause, through hard work, determination, and perseverance, coached one of the finest teams Hempstead High has ever known.

TRACK

The season started with Hempstead overpowering Valley Stream. Successive wins included the defeat of Chaminade, Sewanhaka, Lawrence, and Freeport. In a triangle meet Hempstead won over both Westbury and Chaminade.

When the time came for the Patchogue Relays, Mr. Krause entered four teams, hoping to win one trophy or two at the most; but our four teams took three first places and a third. After the qualifications for the finals in the South Shore meet, we had sixteen men left. These sixteen men, competing with fourteen schools, won the South Shore Championship, making a total of about thirty-five points while our nearest rival, Mepham, made only nineteen. One week later the Sectional Championships were held at Hofstra College. Once again the Hempstead spikemen won over all teams on the Island.

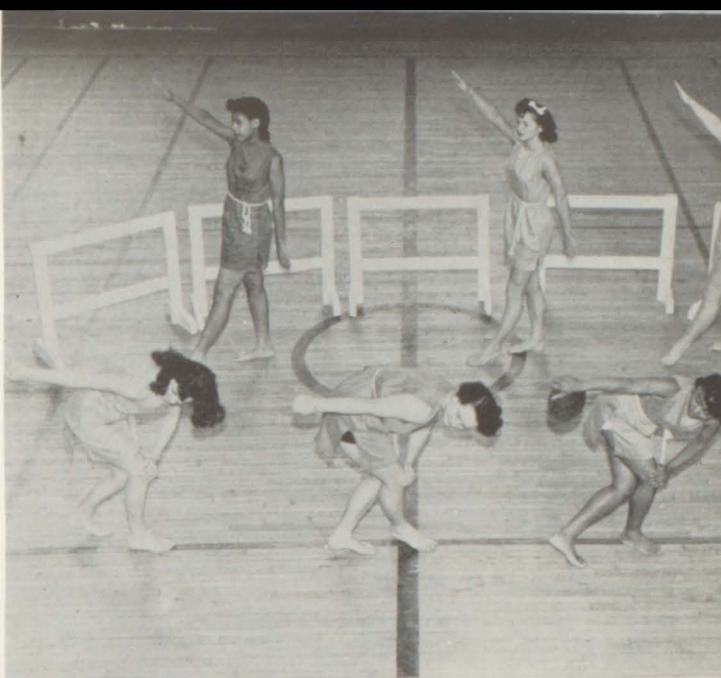

TAKEN for granted each morning in school are the clean floors and warm rooms. If it weren't for the eight custodians and two matrons, whose efforts are greatly appreciated, our halls and rooms wouldn't be clean and warm, nor the floors smooth and free of dirt.

To keep the school clean, a large number of brushes and gallons of floor wax are used. This year three drums of floor wax (totaling 150 gallons) were needed to keep the floors in satisfactory condition. Cleaning the floors was accomplished by the use of fourteen-inch floor brushes. They whipped Chaminade twice, Oceanside twice, Jamaica and Baldwin once each, while losing hard fought matches to Lawrence and Garden City, each twice. They made up for these defeats by drubbing South Side twice, thus ending the 1945 season with a respectable record of eight matches won and four lost.

As a reward for its undefeated 1944 football season Hempstead received the Robert Bacon Football Trophy as the outstanding team in the county. In the playoff game with Lawrence, which the Tigers won, they received the Champion Football Trophy of the South Shore League.

The winged footed boys, under the coaching of Mr. Krause, really went to town last year. A well rounded team without many outstanding stars, the trackmen literally ran the opposition into the ground. Proof of this is the cup given to the Long Island Track Champions. Cups given for events taken in this meet were: 880 yard relay, two mile relay and shuttle-hurdle relay. The Tigers also won the South Shore cup and the Nassau Daily Review Star Track Trophy.

Not to be overlooked were the two cups given to Hempstead for its championship bowling team.

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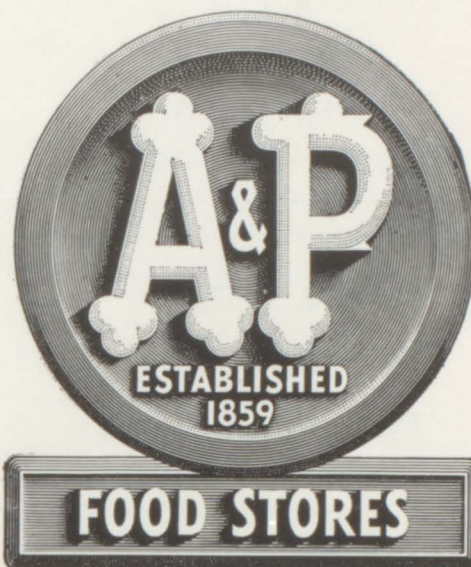

HEMPSTEAD High can well be proud of its faculty members who served in the armed forces during the war.

To look at Miss Billie Webb of Office II, one would never guess that six months ago she was Technical Sergeant Billie Webb of the W.A.C., with almost two years of army service behind her. Mr. Tobani, who prepares your meals in the cafeteria, gained his experience on the Cruiser *Brooklyn*, feeding hungry sailors. As ship's cook he saw service in the Caribbean Sea and North Africa. Mr. Franz, a navy lieutenant, taught gunnery on the Great Lakes, and later spent seventeen months as a loading officer at Pearl Harbor. Mr. Hamburg was active in the "Texas Campaign," where for three years he taught bombing and meteorology as a first lieutenant. Mr. Albinski spent thirty-two months overseas as an army band leader. A chief warrant officer, he led the P.O.A. Band of sixty-five men. Mr. Nilsson, bosun's mate first class, spent two years overseas. Part of this time he coached a basketball team which was so good that the commodore lent them a plane to fly to Guinian, Samar, to play in the Seabees' Pacific Area Championship. Hoping to devise an escape from freshman General Science students, Mr. White helped in the development of radar contact with the moon. He served five years as an army lieutenant. Mr. Mooney, a former air force captain, was one of the first draftees from this area. In almost five years of service, his experience varied from spending Christmas Day in a rubber lifeboat in the middle of the Pacific to studying air borne radar in the California Desert.

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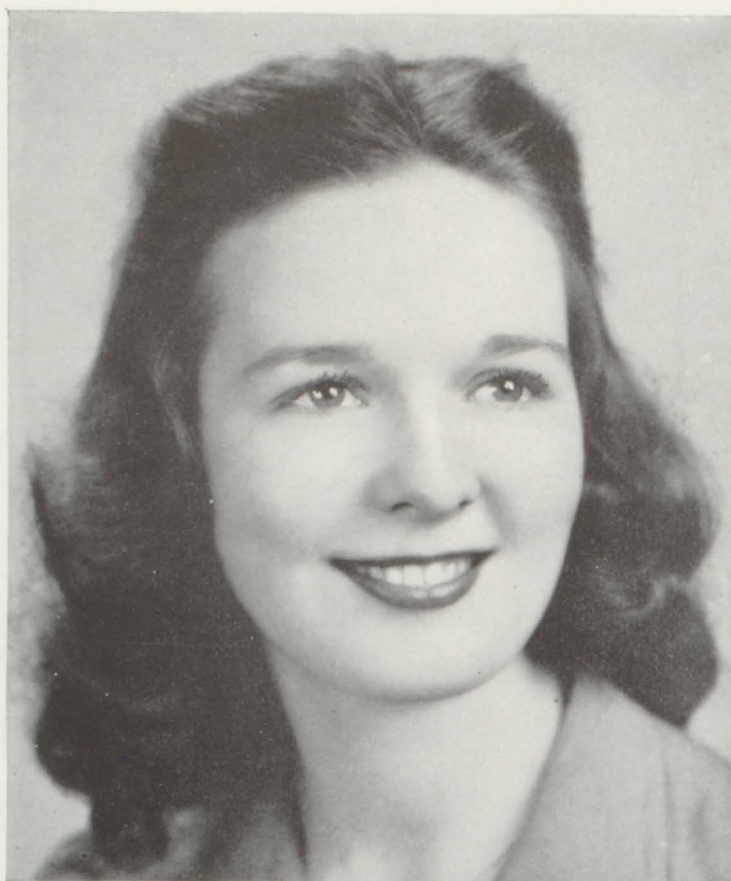
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
