
Dedication

Angels Watch Over Our School

The Board of Education represents the citizens of Hempstead. These men are responsible for authorizing educational programs, providing staff facilities, apportioning funds and preparing the budget for the next school year.

As Superintendent of Schools, Dr. Sheldon is charged with implementing the policies which have been requested by various administrators in our school system. It is Dr. Sheldon's duty to advise the Board of Education, and it is the Board that has the task of transforming recommendations into realities.

Assistant Superintendents Mr. James T. Beale and Dr. Robert Cody share a great deal of the responsibility which Dr. Sheldon has. Dr. Cody is responsible for the instructional phases in the grade schools and Mr. Beale handles the financial aspects and acts as Business Manager.

Recommendations which have become realities this year include the transformation of the Cultural Enrichment Department into the Cultural Arts Education Department, the Prospect School Study Center, six additional remedial classrooms and teachers in the grades, the Fulbright Exchange Teacher from India, Miss Chakravarti, and expanded summer school programs in the high school offering advanced courses in foreign languages, sciences and histories. The entire Board of Education has been responsible for the continued renovation of the classrooms in the high school, as well as continuing the implementation of the original plans for the new high school. Administrative Assistant in charge of buildings and grounds, Mr. Mathias Helbach, has been working closely with our maintenance staff and contractors.


Foreign Exchange Teacher Graces the Scene

Catering to Our Needs









Big Reels In School



These dynamic twelve have given our teams much support and with the humorous touch of the Tiger mascot, eased the tense atmosphere of our games.




A Winning Habit


Hotshots Break Even
